She manages the day-to-day operations of the Network as well as the vital relationships, collaborations, and projects with members and stakeholders





FGM/C ACCORDING TO THE WHO



"FGM/C involves the partial or total removal of external female genitalia or other injury to the female genital organs for non-medical reasons."

TYPES OF FGM/C







Mental and Physical Effects of FGC

Sexual Pain

FGC survivors can experience pain during intercourse, vaginismus, and decreased sexual desire and pleasure

Infections

Immediately after and in the long term, FGC can cause severe infections in the affected region

Childbirth

FGC can cause disrupted labor, postpartum hemorrhaging, and infant and maternal death

Urinary and Vaginal Health

FGC can cause urinary tract problems, painful menstruation, and other long term health issues

Mental Health

FGC is a traumatic experience that can cause PTSD, depression, anxiety, and other mental health issues

Death


Infections from FGC, blood-loss, and other issues can ultimately lead to death











FGM/C IS GLOBAL



History in the U.S.


- FGM/C was routine medical practice in the U.S. for most of the 19th and 20th centuries to prevent and treat lesbianism, masturbation, depression, hysteria, and nymphomania.
 - These procedures were covered by insurance until 1977.
- Recent non-medical incidents reported from members of white Christian communities
- An estimated 500,000+ women and girls living in the U.S. are at risk, or have undergone FGM/C (CDC 2016). However, est. is problematic because:
 - Only examines immigrant communities from specific countries
 - Use indirect techniques = apply country prevalence est. to immigrant communities
 - Does not account for migration factors (i.e. characteristics of women in the country of origin vs. those who have migrated to the U.S.)

THE NUMBER OF WOMEN AND GIRLS AT RISK OF FGM/C VARIES WIDELY ACROSS THE STATES.

Congress declares FGM/C a criminal offense



Federal law amended to include a travel provision

Federal law struck down. Only 27 states have laws against FGM/C




The Federal court denies House appeal of federal law

Islamophobia

Despite the fact that FGM/C has no religion, some people incorrectly think that it only happens in Muslim communities.

Only in Africa

While FGM/C does happen in 29 countries in Africa, it happens in 92 countries globally in total, 63 outside of Africa.

It doesn't happen here

Many in Europe in America don't believe it happens where they live, but that is false.

FGC and Gender-Based Violence

Relationship

FGC is a form of gender-based violence and child abuse.

FGC can be a learned behavior of childhood, is often surrounded by a culture of silence/stigma/shame, and is a form of generational violence like many other types of GBV.



Covid-19 and FGM: Lessons learned from Ebola



Key Effects on FGM Prevention and Care

Social isolation and loss of social support

Loss of access to education, reproductive health & protection services

Loss of livelihoods

New opportunities for young people to take on positive, new roles in their communities



Key Program Recommendations

Support response plans grounded children's rights gender analysis & address the increased risks of GBV

Support efforts aimed at interrupting FGM/C during the pandemic & beyond

Support access to digital tools for education, health, psychosocial support and social protection services (e.g. sexual and reproductive health services, GBV services)

Support research both during and post-pandemic

The Impacts of COVID-19 on FGM/C

Key Findings: Orchid Project Report (September 2020)

- Increased rates of FGM/C reported across East and West Africa due to COVID lockdowns
 - Seen as opportunity to carryout FGM/C undetected
- Lack of FGM/C integration into COVID responses
 - Leaving girls at risk and survivors with no access to services
- Economic hardships pushing parents to seek "bride prices" and cutters who may have abandoned practice to begin again in order to generate income
- Shrinking space and capacity of CSO's to reach communities with FGM/C education and services
 - Lack of funding for CSO's to continue FGM/C work
- Increased use of social media to reach communities
